The City of Decatur is now accepting applications for the Decatur Small Business Rapid Relief Funds Round 3. The City was awarded \$1.2 Million from the DCEO CURE-ES program to provide to our small businesses and hospitality industry. Applications will be accepted electronically beginning November 29th until 3:00 pm on December 10th through the City of Decatur's website.

This grant is being made available to reimburse Decatur businesses for expenses incurred between March 1 and December 30, 2021 related outdoor dining expenses, PPE purchases, as well as mortgage/rent and utility relief. Hotels/motels, bars and restaurants, as well as other small businesses are encouraged to apply immediately online for this grant opportunity to help alleviate the financial constraint the COVID pandemic has had on businesses. Homebased businesses are not eligible. Businesses who have not received funding in Rounds 1 & 2 will be given priority.

#### Small Business Rapid Relief Funds Program Round 3 Utility Assistance

The Small Business Rapid Relief Funds Program for Utility—Gas/Electric reimbursement of up to \$10,000 for small businesses who have been hit hard by the Pandemic. Many businesses have had to close their doors entirely, as curbside dining and carryout options were not enough to cover their overhead costs. Expenses must have incurred between March 1, 2020 and December 30, 2021. The business and/or business owner must have a valid Federal Employer Identification Number (FEIN) or a valid social security number. Businesses must demonstrate the impact of COVID-19 through the most recent financial statements. The business must demonstrate it was established and in operation by December 31, 2019. Funding will be paid to the business owner and will be given on a first-come basis with priority given to businesses who have been COVID-19 compliant. Submission of an application is not a guarantee of financial assistance.

Expenses must have incurred between March 1, 2020 and December 30, 2021. The business and/or business owner must have a valid Federal Employer Identification Number (FEIN) or a valid social security number. Businesses must demonstrate the impact of COVID-19 through the most recent financial statements. The business must demonstrate it was established and in operation by December 31, 2019. Funding will be paid to the business owner and will be given on a first-come basis with priority given to businesses who have been COVID-19 compliant. ## Small Business Rapid Relief Funds Program Round 3 Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

The Small Business Rapid Relief Funds Program for Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) reimbursement of up to \$6,000 for businesses who have been hit hard by the Pandemic. Many small businesses purchased extra personal protective equipment: i.e. gloves, masks, sanitizer, and the installation of shields on windows, and at checkout/payment areas, increased purchase of disinfectants, the hiring of local professional sanitization services. Expenses must have incurred between March 1, 2020 and December 30, 2021. The business and/or business owner(s) must have a valid Federal Employer Identification Number (FEIN) or a valid social security number. Businesses must demonstrate the impact of COVID-19 through the most recent financial statements. The business must demonstrate it was established and in operation by December 31, 2019. Funding will be paid to the business owner(s) and will be given on a first-come basis with priority given to businesses who have been COVID-19 compliant.
